Western religions in general have a pattern of taking a very deep and profound spirituality, one that requires an entire lifetime to grow into, and dilute it down to a level a seven-yearold can understand. And then we never grow it back up.

When it comes to religion, we still talk to fully grown, well-educated adults like they're eight-year-olds who are incapable of cutting their own pork chops or understanding that babies don't come from storks? Why do we do this? We simplify deep and profound spiritual truths to mere pablum and then wonder why no one listens.

Most people seek depth, meaning, insight, and connection, but not a superficial connection. They long for a profound connection with truth, love, and joy, which is exactly the sort of connection Eucharist could/should facilitate.
